Pathways are clear to allow people with wheelchairs or baby strollers to pass.		
Sheltered seating at regular intervals, with and without armrests.		
Handrails on slopes are provided where possible.		
Signage is clear and consistent, with raised lettering, Braille, and symbols.		
Maps illustrating path gradients and steep paths, as well as seating and facilities, are provided.		
Step-free viewing areas if main viewing point is difficult to access.		
Barriers or guardrails are installed in elevated locations.		
Aromatic plants or audible features at the beginning and end of trails and viewpoints to help with wayfinding.
